- around 600 professors on 90 selection committees



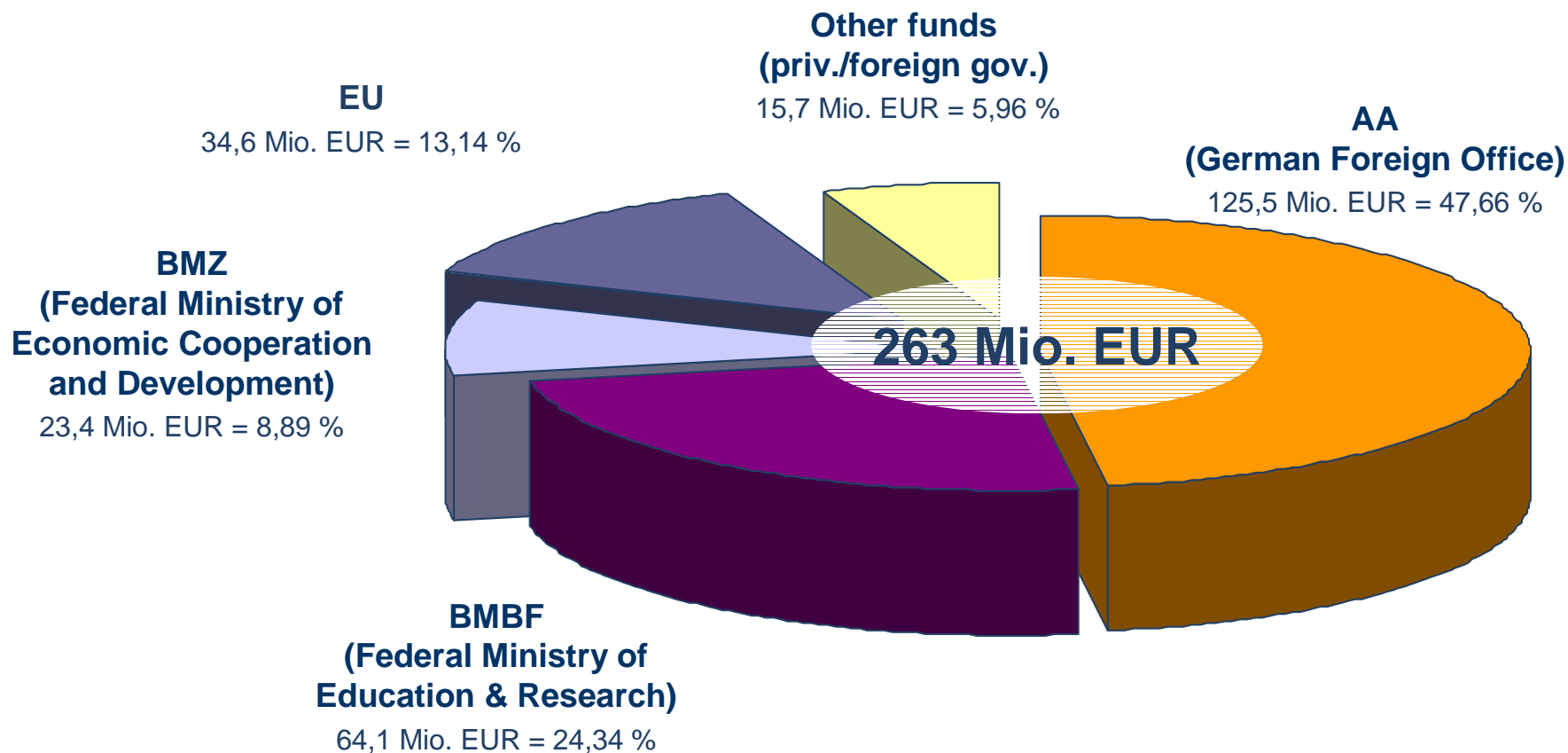

Scholarships for foreigners

Promoting young foreign elites at German universities and research institutes

59 mio euros

Scholarships for Germans

Promoting young German leaders of the future in their studies and research abroad (including ERASMUS)

70 mio euros

Internationalisation of German universities

Increasing the international appeal of German universities (including marketing) and promoting the international dimension in German higher education

57 mio euros

Promoting German studies and the German language abroad

Promoting German studies, German language and area studies programmes (including Lektors) at foreign universities

36 mio euros

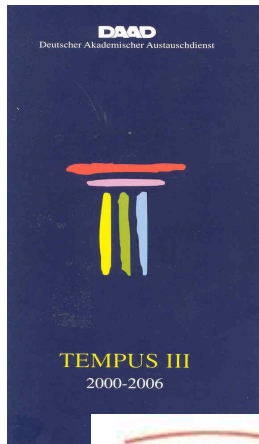
Educational cooperation with developing countries

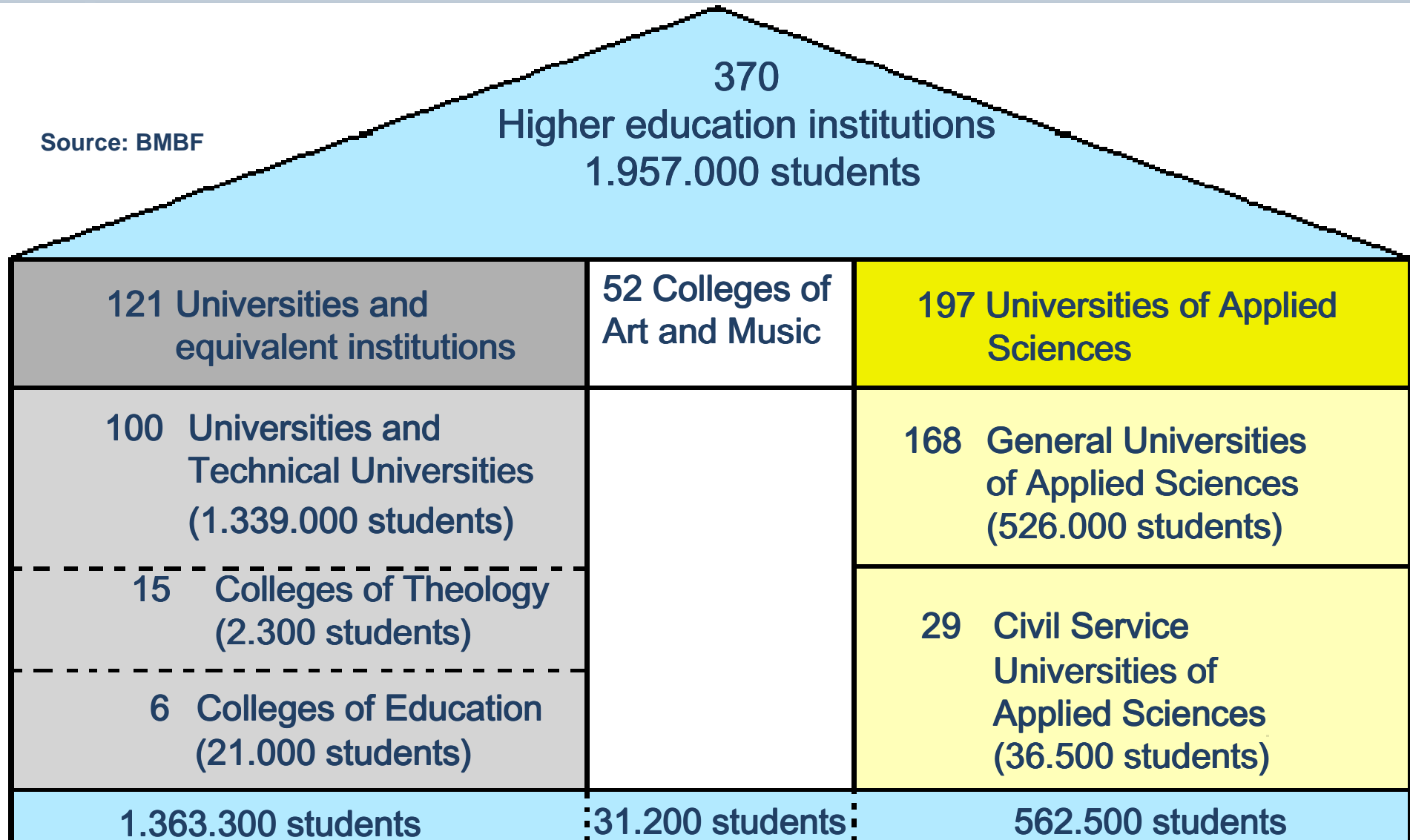

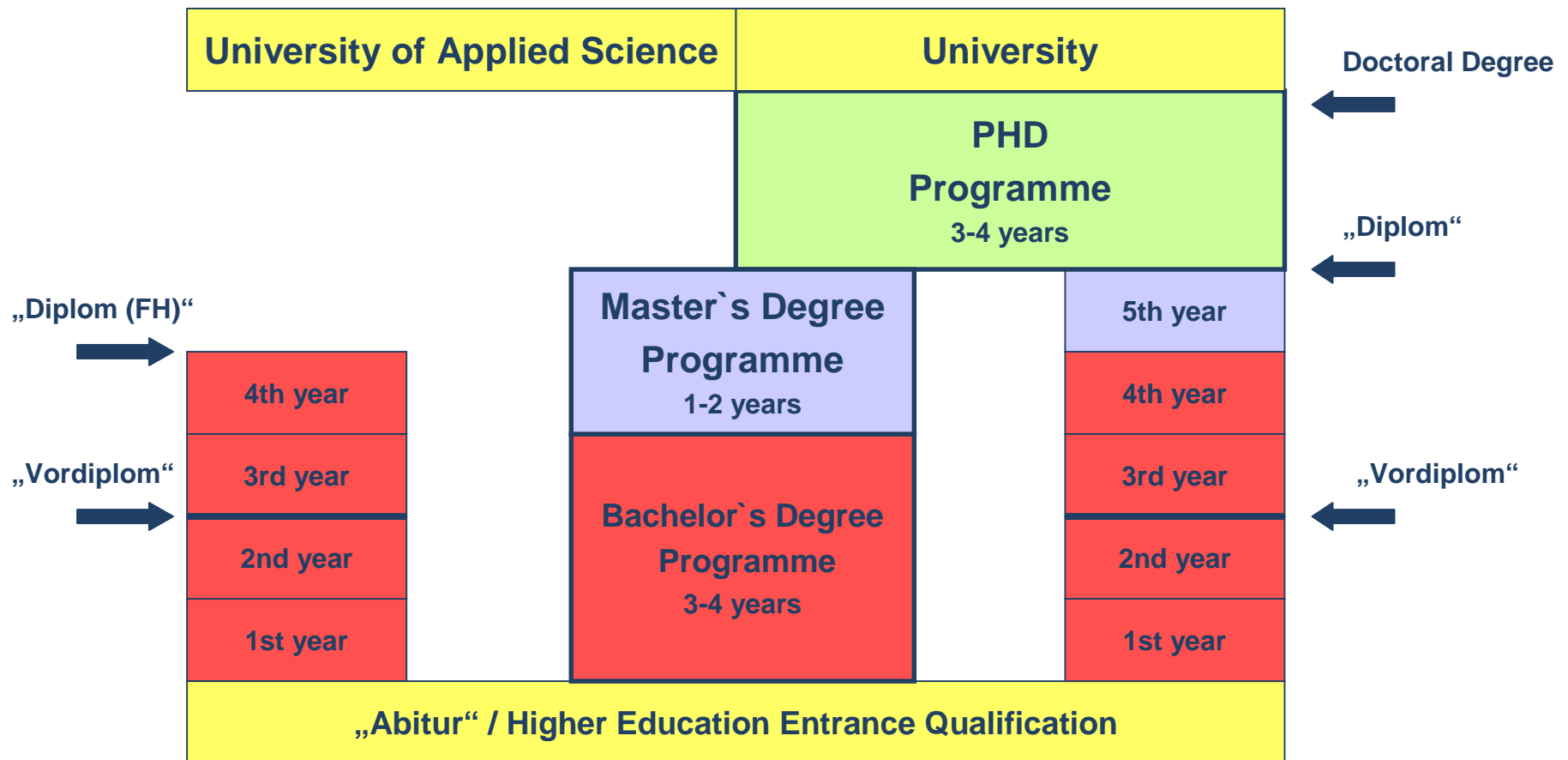
Types of Higher Education Institutions in Germany

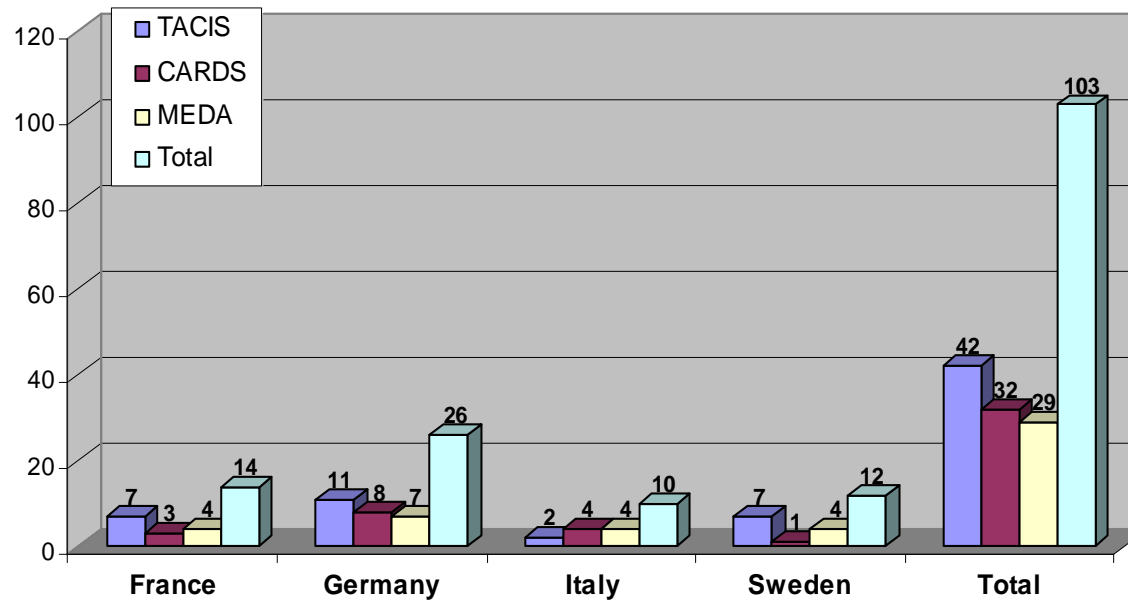
Basic Structure of German Higher Education System

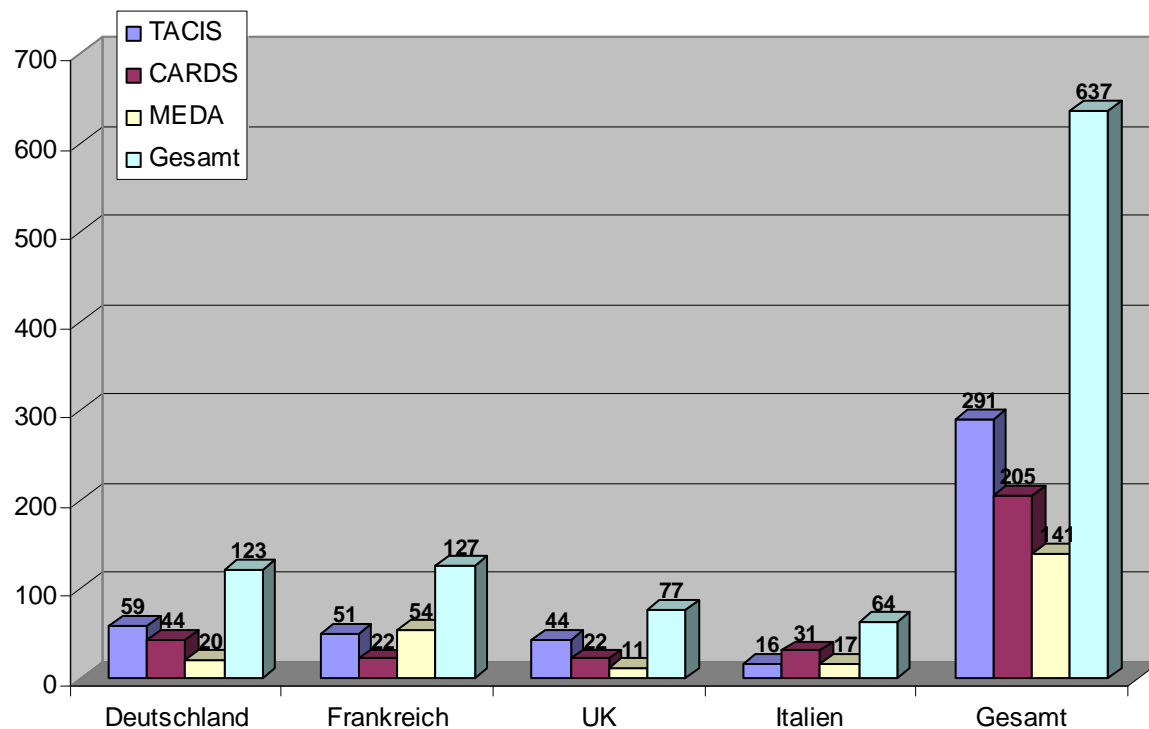

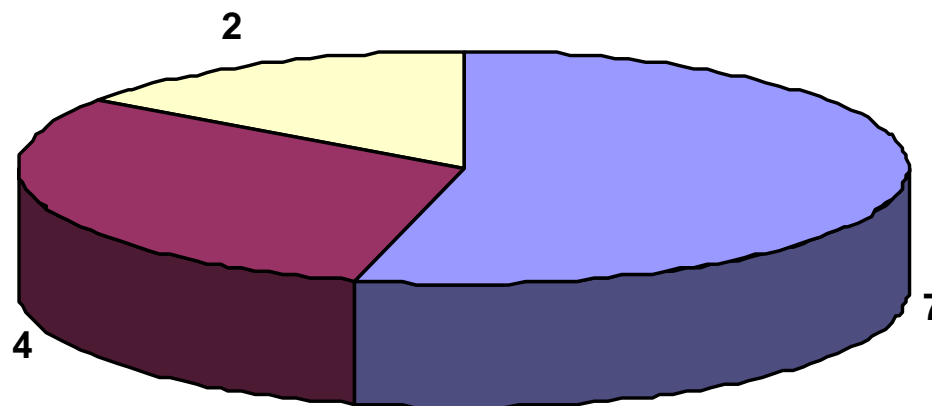

TEMPUS IV (2007 - 2013)



TEMPUS IV will be financed through three instruments:

- ENPI – *European Neighbourhood and Partnership Instrument* covering **Eastern Europe and the Mediterranean**
- DCI – *Development Cooperation Instrument* covering **Central Asia**
- IPA – *European Instrument for Pre-Accession* covering the **Western Balkans**

- Individual Mobility Grants (IMGs) are closed down
- Just one deadline per year for all types of grants
- Higher education institutions in the partner countries can act as grant applicants and grantholders



Erasmus Mundus *External Cooperation Window* from 2006 on

Mobility scheme addressing student and academic exchanges with Third Countries

➤ **Geographical coverage**

TEMPUS Partner Countries plus Iraq, Iran, Israel and Yemen

➤ **Funded activities**

Student and staff mobility (grants from EUR 1000 up to 2500 per month)

Organisation of mobility

➤ **Size of grants**

Between EUR 1 million and 6 million for last call of proposals, new budget is not yet decided

News

Second call for proposals is expected for 2007 including Egypt most probably
