- International student organisations.






Student survey

(12,820 responses - around 40% non mobile)


- **Staff survey** (786 responses)



Student impressions: mobility programmes




- Short-term mobilities were more popular among students from fewer opportunities background
- 16% of respondents from ethnic minority backgrounds and 13% of respondents from low-income backgrounds participated in short-term mobilities

Offer different mobility programmes with a variety of durations. Ensure short term mobilities are embedded in the internationalisation strategy.



3 Barrier types

Institutional

Barriers that **reflect the programmes** that are being offered and the **regulations that coincide** with these programmes that may **impact the access** of specific student groups to mobility opportunities.

Environmental

Environmental and **societal factors** that influence the person's decisions to take part in a mobility.

Access to information as well as personal backgrounds impact mobility participation.


Attitudinal

Attitudinal barriers tackle the **belief system and emotions** around the topic of mobility opportunities, to see how they influence their participation rates.

Internalised barriers

can severely impact their identification with the opportunity.

Barriers to mobility



of students reported advancing initial costs to be a barrier to participate in mobility. "I am someone who has to combine five jobs to pay for my room and studies."


"I have to spend everything I earn immediately. Saving for Erasmus is therefore extremely difficult."

Non-mobile students' blocking factors to go abroad



Barriers to mobility



17% of non-mobile entries in a second while a going abroad was a barrier of **non-mobile ethnic minority** respondents

43% of respondents from low-income backgrounds reported strong concerns related to upfront costs and loss of job

49% of both mobile and non-mobile respondents have concerns relating to finding accommodation abroad

Create a safe space where students can discuss their fears without judgement, and if needed seek specialist advice to respond to the students' queries.

Pre-departure support for mobile students




Encouragement for non-mobile students



- 53% of non-mobile students need more information on the types of programmes available
- 47% felt that hearing from employers who value international experiences could be useful
- 47% of students would like to hear from their peers who have been abroad

Ensure that the application process is easy to navigate, and where possible **simplify the process** by removing unnecessary paperwork or steps in the procedure.

Student impressions: Inclusion & Equality of international students



had **positive** experiences while abroad.




of students felt that they were treated differently or unfairly at their host university



felt that they did not have equal access to resources and opportunities compared to home students.

Student impression: discrimination on exchange

76% did not experience any form of discrimination during their exchange



Technical recommendations for more inclusive mobility



Technical recommendations to adapt the Erasmus+ documents involved in Erasmus+ student mobilities



The SIEM technical recommendations provide an **analysis of possible changes** that could be implemented to the key documents and processes involved in Erasmus+ Higher Education mobilities in order to make them more inclusive.

They target the European Commission, Erasmus+ National Agencies, Higher Education Institutions and other policy makers and stakeholders interested in Erasmus+ and mobility programmes.

What is the ESNsurvey?

- The ESNsurvey is a Europe-wide research project covering different topics concerning mobility and education. It is the largest project of its kind carried out solely by volunteers.
- The survey seeks to monitor the implementation of mobility programmes and the experience of international learners abroad, as well as the perceptions of students who have not participated in international student mobility yet.






Pre-departure support: Accessibility of information and peer-to-peer support are essential




Initiatives from the EU: There are still lack of knowledge of some EU initiatives among non-mobile students




Challenges faced by students: Lack of funding, affordability of accommodation and problems with courses are still the main challenges



Digitalisation: the commitment to digital transformation has the potential to improve the experience of Erasmus+ participants, especially for the ones with fewer opportunities




Recognition of Credits: 42% of the respondents revealed that their courses needed to be changed during exchange




Erasmus+ priorities: Students believe in the programme and consider it lives up to its priorities

82%	Agree (36%) or strongly agree (46%) with "Erasmus+ is inclusive for students from different background"
75%	Agree (35%) or strongly agree (40%) with "Erasmus+ contributes to the acquisition of sustainable skills, habits and behaviours among
69%	Agree (38%) or strongly agree (31%) with "Erasmus+ encourages civic engagement during exchanges"
64%	Agree (39%) or strongly agree (25%) with "Erasmus+ offers digital solutions to facilitate the mobility process". Digital skills: 53%

Top-ups: The inclusion top-up was well received by students, showing the positive results of the implementation of the inclusion measures!



Timing of the grants: The efforts are visible, especially regarding students with fewer opportunities but that it's still a long path to walk
