#### A: Plug-in Modules at TU München

Interdisciplinary, innovative and cooperative: in plug-in modules, students work together with their peers from all schools on projects that transcend disciplinary boundaries. Thus, they develop individual talents and skills in a wide range of future-oriented fields.

#### **B: MC4Data at TH Nürnberg**

MC4Data is the Micro-credential programme for Data Analytics at Technische Hochschule Nürnberg Georg Simon Ohm. The qualification programme teaches the basics of data analytics and thereby strengthens the data competence of its students.

#### C: Project SPEND at Hochschule Ravensburg Weingarten

The central goal of the project is to use the advantages of intensively digitalized elements in teaching and explore the added value of micro-credentials for universities. RWU combines its micro-credentials as "Studium Digitale" and can thus offer students an extended range of courses to individualize their studies and set priorities. In the medium term, RWU also wants to open up parts of "Studium Digitale" to external target groups and thus make it available for study orientation or academic further education.

## Micro-credentials and internationalisation: "By-product" or a strategic goal in its own right?

Ana-Marija Cvitic, Strategy Officer ENHANCE - The European Universities of Technology Alliance

This session will explore how micro-credentials can be used as a complementary instrument to initiate or accompany international exchange.

Whereas the 2022 Council Recommendation does not explicitly mention the use of micro-credentials in the internationalisation context, it does so implicitly by ascribing an important role to the activities of the European Universities Alliances. We will discuss if the advancement of internationalisation is merely a "by-product" of micro-credentials or whether these learning units offer HEI the opportunity to strengthen the strategic direction of internationalisation.
